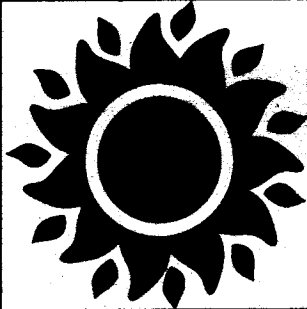


2003 Annual Meeting Review

The 2003 Annual Homeowners Association Meeting was held at 7 p.m. at Krahn Elementary School on Thursday, April 24. Members of the Board, representatives of CIA Services, the Board's attorney, representatives from the Sheriff's department, as well as many homeowners were in attendance.

President Danny Woods called the meeting to order, welcoming all homeowners and introducing the Board Members, Kim Easterling and Lisa Beckham of C.I.A. Services, Richard Olsen, Events Coordinator Kathleen Smith and the deputies.

The 2002 Annual Meeting Minutes were reviewed by Director Hill who then turned the meeting over to President Woods for a review of the 2002 accomplishments.

President Woods outlined the changes and improvements made during 2002, including the excellent collection rate at the end of the year, Christmas decorating contest, continued newsletter production, community events such as the annual garage sale, Easter Eggstravaganza, Fall Festival and National Night Out events, all vandalism repairs to park/pool area including new fence around park and extra lighting, new playground equipment, new volleyball court, new established ACC guidelines and

new activity groups held at the clubhouse. After all the 2002 accomplishments were reviewed, the meeting was turned over to Director Grychka to review the outlook for 2003.

The plans to erect a new monument at the 1st Spruce Run entrance, the resurfacing of the entire pool (completed), plans to possibly upgrade and redesign the baby pool, new perennial color at all areas and the hiring of a new pool management company, Greater Houston Pool Management and many other things were discussed for completion in 2003. The floor was then turned over to Director Zorzi to read the financial report.

After the financial report was read and discussed, Director Hill opened the floor for nominations. No candidates were nominated. Directors Woods and Zorzi were up for reelection uncontested. Because they were running unopposed, they were accepted by acclamation and will retain their positions until the year 2006.

President Woods opened the floor for general discussion. Security services, the Trash Company, 2003 legislative issues concerning HOA's, various County issues and deed restriction violations were among the topics discussed during the open forum. Attorney Olsen informed those present that he

had taken over Attorney Soard's practice and addressed various legal concerns including the media attention concerning foreclosures.

Secretary Hill announced that the yard of the month selection would begin soon, encouraged everyone to attend the homeowners meetings monthly, reviewed the remaining pool registration dates, the late pool pass fee and pool hours, National Night Out and stated when the next newsletter deadline would be.

2003 Late Pool Pass Procedures

To process your 2003 pool passes after 3 pm on Saturday, May 3, 2002:

If you failed to have your 2003 pool passes made or validated at one of the five pool pass registrations in March, April and May, or if you are a new resident, this information is for you.

To take care of your 2003 Pool Passes you will need:

- An envelope with your last name and address printed legibly on it
- Cash or a check for the *late fee* in the amount of \$15 made out to CCVCA, and either
- Your existing pool passes to be punched for the 2003 pool season, or
- Thumbnail sized photographs of everyone in your household ages 3 and over. (These pictures will be laminated on to your pass)
- If you are having new passes made, make sure you label each picture so I know which picture goes with which pass.

You may pick up the registration form that must be filled out and signed by someone 18 years or older at 9423 Bayou Bluff Drive. Place all the materials in the envelope you bring and place it in the designated drop box on the front porch. You will be contacted when your passes are ready to be picked up, so make sure your telephone number is included.

If you need to purchase guest passes, please bring:

- An envelope with your name and address printed legibly on the front, and
- Cash or a check made out to CCVCA for the amount of guest passes you wish to purchase.

Guest passes are sold in \$5 and \$10 increments and work out to \$1 per guest per day. Guest passes do not expire, so any unused cards may be used in the coming years. *There is no late fee for guest passes.* Guest passes will be available for pick up within 3-4 days.

Please note that if you are a new resident, one who moved in any time after May 1, 2003, you are exempt from the \$15 late fee.

If you are not a new resident and did not have your passes validated by 3 pm on May 3, you must pay the late fee. There will be no exceptions.

The CCV Deed Restriction states: No more than 2 of each type of household pet may be kept on any one lot. When outside of fence or home, pets MUST be on a leash. This is the LAW.

Don't forget to clean up after your pets!

Recycling

Don't forget to recycle. Place all recyclable goods in your recycling container ready for pickup at the curb on Monday mornings before 7 a.m. Heavy trash pick up day is Monday.

Trash Processing

Trash cans must be within 3 feet of the curb on trash day. TEW is not required to process garbage left beyond 3 feet.

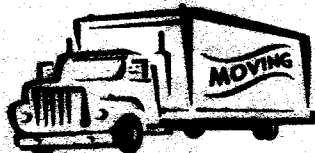
For your seasonal tasks, consider summer as the intensive lawn-care season, fall as the time to caulk and paint. And spring, this wondrous season when the birds are singing and the flowers burst into bloom, is the traditional time for cleaning.

Here are some chores you should include on your spring cleaning list to make sure your home continues to shine like the springtime sun:

Walk Around the Outside

Look for those sagging or loose gutters, window frames or siding. Is your roof missing any shingles, or is there any water damage under the eaves? Promptly schedule repairs for those items you can't do yourself.

Walk around your yard as if you were a first-time visitor. What impression



How to Avoid Fraudulent Moving Companies

Moving is stressful enough without having to worry about whether your belongings will arrive or what condition they will arrive in.

It's estimated that 1.4 to 1.6 million households move each year and while most moves go smoothly, the U.S. Department of Transportation receives about 3,000 to 4,000 complaints each year from consumers claim to have been victimized by moving companies.

A Common scenario is, someone hires a moving company via the internet due to low estimate. When the truck shows up at the destination, the estimate doubles or triples from the original. The consumer is then told that unless the new bill is paid, their possessions will be sold at auction.

In other instances moving companies will fail to deliver or deliver damaged goods, then refuse to compensate them for loss and damages

does your home make? Be sure to clear away fallen branches and leaves? Loosen the soil around perennials, plant annuals or a vegetable garden. Prune shrubs and trees.

Don't forget the backyard! Is it time to condition your deck? Be sure to hammer in any loose nails, or replace them with galvanized deck screws. Replace any broken boards or rails. Consider renting a power washer to clean dirt and mildew from the wood, and then apply an all-weather sealer or stain. Then dust off that patio furniture you kept protected over the winter.

Repair any broken fence boards and paint or seal them as needed. Clean the pool if it has been covered all winter. Wash windows, screens and windowsills; repair any winter damage.

Take A Tour Inside

Start making a list of things to do in each room. Then dive in. Dust walls and ceilings to remove cobwebs and wash any grimy areas. Wash window curtains or remove drapes for dry cleaning. Deep clean rugs and carpets. Dust and polish wood or laminate floors.

Clean fan blades using mild soapy water. Check the central air-

conditioning unit for debris and obstructions; vacuum the main condenser coil on top of the unit. Check the operating condition of window air-conditioning units; remove and wash filters in mild soapy water.

Make sure all exhaust fans and vents are clean and clear. Don't forget to remove the lint buildup from the clothes dryer vent.

One often-overlooked area is the fireplace. Be sure to sweep ashes carefully into your fireplace's ash pit or into a dustpan. Clean and lightly oil fireplace tools. Remember it's springtime so decorate the fireplace or wood stove with a large silk flower arrangement.

Homeowners already have a clear financial investment in their homes. Protecting that investment requires a diligent home maintenance program. And spring is the perfect time for those deep cleaning chores.

These horror stories have been chronicled across the country by newspapers and television alike.

The national trade association representing the nation's moving and storage companies, The American Moving and Storage Association, has created the following list to assist consumers in making a smart choice about movers.

Their tips include:

Make moving arrangements in advance.

Check all companies with your local Better Business Bureau.

Get at least three bids.

Inform each company of the destination and timing of your move.

Ask about the types of services they offer, and rates and charges that will apply.

Ask what their liability is for your belongings and what claims protection you will have.

Ask how pickup and delivery will work.

Ask them to explain their estimates in detail and give you a copy.

If you get a non-binding estimates, actual

charges may exceed the estimate, so be sure you should have enough cash or a certified check to pay the estimated cost of your move plus 10 percent more at time of delivery.

Specify pickup and delivery dates in the order for service.

The Bill of Lading is your contract with the mover, so read it carefully. If you have any questions ask your mover.

You have the right to be present each time your shipment is weighed, and you may request a reweigh of your shipment.

Unresolved claims for loss or damage may be submitted to arbitration.

If you are moving interstate, moving companies should give you a copy of a consumer booklet entitled Your Rights and Responsibilities When You Move and information regarding the mover's participation in a Dispute Settlement Program.

After you've gathered this information, compare bids to see which mover best suits your needs and budget.

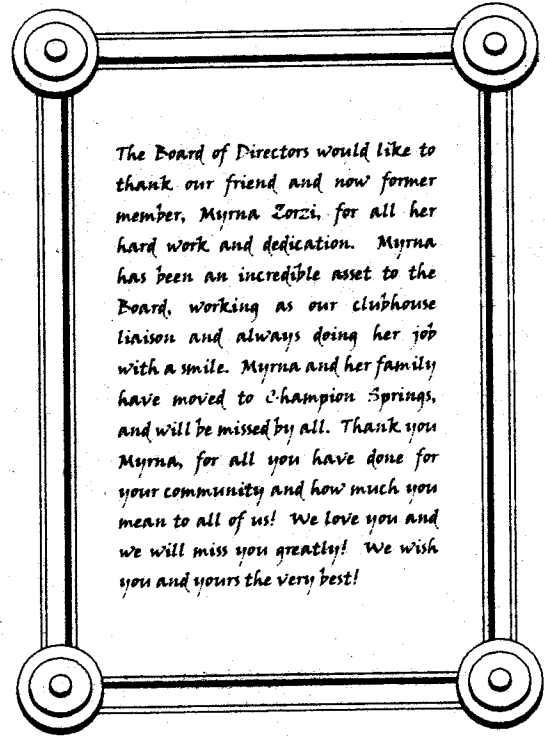
Thank You!
